## Marconi Property Owners Face Over \$3 Million in Fines

On Friday April 26, 2024, the State Board of Land and Natural Resources (Board) met to consider proposed fines of over \$3 million against multiple landowners at "Marconi Point" for the death of Ho'okipa (an adult female Laysan Albatross, an indigenous seabird species), the destruction of an estimated 300 Yellow-Faced Bees (endangered endemic species), and the devastation of 2 acres of shoreline habitat (mature heliotrope and naupaka).

Unfortunately, the landowners' attorneys strategically called for a "contested case" after the staff of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR), Division of Forestry and Wildlife (DOFAW), and the Office of Coastal and Conservation Lands (OCCL) made their presentations asking the Board for substantial fines and remedies. The landowners' attorneys refused to consent to allow testimony to continue, forcing BLNR to terminate the hearing without a decision and

abruptly cut off a pipeline of live testimony from dozens of concerned community members and experts who had waited over five hours to testify.

The DLNR staff proposed total fines of \$3,157,500; \$1,502,500 for unauthorized take of Yellow-Faced Bees, \$45,000 for the death of Ho'okipa (the Laysan Albatross), \$1,640,000 for habitat destruction including removal of over 106 native

coastal trees. The DLNR staff also requested remedial actions including removal of a massive iron fence, habitat restoration, conservation easements, and permanent protective signage.

North Shore resident Lynell DaMate, who waited at the BLNR hearing room all day to testify, stated: "The landowners should be ashamed for stopping the public testimony. People have a right to be heard. This is our coastline, our native species, our 'āina – it does not belong to these newly arrived wealthy investors. We all need to stand up for our native wildlife!"

Kahuku resident Angela Huntemer, who also waited the entire day at the Board room, was disappointed. She said, "We won't walk away from attempts to silence concerned community members and experts. Our community is really troubled by the range of allegations at Marconi Point. Folks with first-hand knowledge of the ecosystems out there were not heard from on Friday. Obviously, the landowners didn't want people to know the truth."

Albatross monitoring volunteer Chris Tarki has spent the last six years, several times each week, personally monitoring and protecting the health of the Albatross adults, eggs, and chicks at Marconi and Kahuku Point. In December 2023, Chris had the gruesome task of taking the dead body of the beloved Ho'okipa for an autopsy. Chris was particularly upset to learn from the Board proceedings that Ho'okipa, who was found entangled in the wrought iron fence by another volunteer, died from blunt force trauma because a landscape worker on "Condo Unit 1" of the Marconi properties intentionally threw a rock at her head.

Even though interrupted, the Board hearing shone a bright light on the raft of alleged violations on the Marconi site. It also surfaced concerns about other serious incidents that warrant further investigation, including an endangered monk seal's death on the beach in front of the development, unpermitted draining of wetlands, demolition of historic buildings and cultural sites, and improper commercial activities on agriculturally zoned lands.

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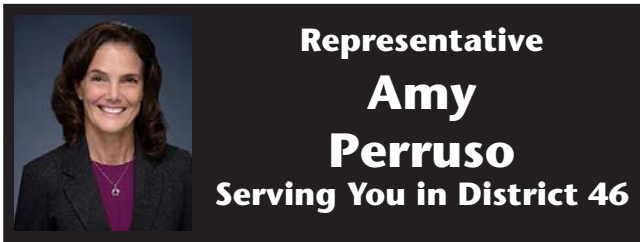

### **The Fiscal Implications of HB 2404: A Closer Look at Revenue Loss and Social Investment**

As session comes to a close, we are proposing a new approach to state budgeting based on adjustments to our state income tax brackets. HB 2404, while promising to adjust and index income tax brackets to inflation, raises significant concerns about the sustainability of Hawaii's fiscal health and its long-term impacts on public services. By 2031, the legislation is projected to result in a substantial revenue loss of approximately \$1.4 billion (in 2024 dollars). Notably, 43% of these benefits will accrue to those in the top 20% income bracket, highlighting a skewed distribution that favors the wealthy.

The immediate fiscal effects are equally daunting. In 2025 alone, the state is anticipated to face a revenue shortfall of \$656 million due to the proposed tax adjustments. This reduction in state income has serious implications for Hawaii's ability to fund essential public services, including social services and public education.

#### **Impact on Public Services**

The loss of revenue directly translates into decreased fiscal capacity to invest in critical areas. Public education, which relies heavily on state funding for everything from infrastructure improvements to teacher salaries and educational programs, could see significant cutbacks. The potential underfunding could exacerbate educational disparities, particularly affecting lower-income communities that are more reliant on public schooling.

Similarly, social services—which include health-care, welfare programs, and housing assistance—are at risk. These programs are essential for the welfare of the state's most vulnerable populations, and cuts here could lead to increased poverty rates and broader social issues.

#### **Long-term Economic Implications**

The distribution of tax benefits under HB 2404, where a significant portion of the fiscal relief is allocated to the wealthiest, raises questions about the equity and efficacy of the proposed new income tax policy. Economically, while the intent is to stimulate spending by increasing disposable income, the skew towards higher earners could result in less effective economic stimulation. Wealthier individuals

tend to save rather than spend additional income, reducing the potential multiplier effect that would come from more broad-based tax relief targeted at lower-income earners.

Moreover, the substantial revenue losses projected for the coming years suggest that the state may struggle to invest in infrastructure and other long-term projects critical for economic growth. These investments are crucial for improving the business environment and can lead to job creation and higher long-term economic output.

#### **Conclusion**

As we weigh the merits of HB 2404, it is crucial to consider not only the immediate benefits but also the long-term fiscal and social implications of such significant tax adjustments. The projected loss of revenue and its disproportionate distribution raises important questions about fairness and the role of tax policy in promoting a just society. Ensuring that fiscal policies do not undermine the state's ability to provide essential services will be key to maintaining Hawaii's economic health and social fabric.

## 13th Annual Friends of Sunset Beach Fundraiser Keeping the Arts Alive for North Shore Youth

On Saturday, April 20th Friends of Sunset Beach, a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing art and music education to the North Shore community’s youth, held their 13th annual fundraiser, Celebrating the Arts with featured artist Margie Rice. Guests enjoyed live performances by special musical guests Marty Saito, Keala Rangel, Tavana, and the Steven Inglis band. Bids were made on silent and live auctions with art from some of Hawaii’s most accomplished professionals as well as North Shore’s own Sunset Beach Elementary School students.

Each year, the ticket sales and art auction sales from this event raise money to provide the supplies and salary for art education at Sunset Beach Elementary—neither art nor music education are in this small public school’s budget. This 2023-2024 school year, FOSB has been able to fund a full-time art curriculum, taught by Lilly Barels, as well as supplies, for the K-6 students at Sunset Beach Elementary.

In the past 12 years, FOSB has raised approximately \$370,000, serving 400 Sunset Beach Elementary students annually, in addition to 700 more children throughout the year, hosting pop-up art tents at community events like the Menehune Surf Contest where children can take part in painting, crafts and other forms of artistic expression for free. FOSB’s

long-term goal is to have enough funds to support art education at other North Shore schools.

Aloha friends and neighbors,

I'm excited to announce that Haleiwa's iconic Anahulu Bridge will be getting some much needed attention. In order to address public safety concerns and enhance the longevity of the bridge, the City began rehabilitation work on Monday, April 29, to repair cracks, address corrosion, and improve its structural integrity. The work is expected to continue for approximately one year, and work hours will be Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., excluding holidays. The bridge will remain open to vehicular traffic during the construction period, and a temporary lane closure may be implemented, but only if it is determined to be necessary. One sidewalk will be closed at a time while the other sidewalk remains open to pedestrians, and recreational use of the waterway will be maintained during the construction period. Motorists and pedestrians are advised to allow for extra time while navigating through the area. Questions, comments, and concerns can be submitted to the Department of Design and Construction by calling 808-768-8400.

Turning now to community news, I'd like to highlight two individuals that we recently honored at City Council. On March 27, the Council presented an honorary certificate to Tamara King, Hawaii's 2024 Librarian of the Year. Tamara is the Public Librarian and Branch Manager at Kahuku Public and School Library. Along with her dedicated staff and volunteers, Tamara provides a variety of books, equipment, and experiences for everyone in the community, from keiki to kūpuna. She was also integral to the creation of the Ko'olauloa Battle of the Books program, which held its sixth competition just last month.

On April 17, the Council presented an honorary certificate to Randy Ching for his lifelong dedication to the protection and enhancement of our native ecosystems, and for fostering the next generation of environmental advocates. Although Randy does not live in the North Shore, he is well loved by many in the community for his public service and volunteer work across the island, including but not limited to building and maintaining trail systems, coordinating service trips, and helping to plant and water thousands, if not tens of thousands, of trees.

Finally, I would like to remind the community about the Mayor's upcoming Town Hall meetings. There will be on at Waialua Elementary School on May 16, 2024, at 7pm, and the Ko'olauloa Town Hall meeting will take place at Hau'ula Elementary School on May 30, 2024, at 7:00pm. Please mark your calendars and try to at-

tend if you can. These meetings provide an invaluable opportunity to share your insights and concerns directly to the Mayor and the heads of our City Departments.

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## North Shore First Responder Center – Island-Wide Support Tops 7,000 as Community Prepares for Mayor’s Town Hall on May 16

Community supporters of the proposed North Shore First Responder Center are being boosted by support from more than 7,000 supporters across O’ahu as they prepare to deliver a positive message of “mahalo! Let’s work together to make the North Shore First Responder Center vision our reality!” to Mayor Blangiardi at the Town Hall at Waialua Elementary on Thursday May 16, 2024, at 7:00 pm.

The City and County of Honolulu project was originally proposed by the Mayor’s team to the Sunset Beach Community Association in March 2023, which enthusiastically supported the idea. The new center would add a desperately needed ambulance station to the Sunset/Pūpūkea area and be co-located with a new Ocean Safety District headquarters that is currently in a run-down old house at Rock Piles.

According to the Mayor’s office, “Mayor Blangiardi is in strong support of a First Responder Center on the North Shore. The property at Shark’s Cove . . . is not owned by the City. A private developer owns that land. We have met with him and asked if he would be willing to sell to us and at this time he is not.”

So, the key is changing the landowner’s position from “not yet willing to sell” to “enthusiastic supporter for a legacy project that sustains the health and safety of the North Shore and benefits all who visit our rural community.” Once the landowner agrees to cooperate with the City, the Mayor could unlock the door to millions of existing City Clean Water and Natural Lands Funds that could be used for the acquisition of the property. The special funding would protect the significant open space and conservation values on the site (buffering impacts to neighbors and to the Kapo’o/Sharks Cove area of the Pūpūkea Marine Life Conservation District) while allowing a small footprint for an emergency response center. The new facility would also bring long-term career employment opportunities to our youth as emergency services technicians (EMTs) and ocean safety officers.

To support our amazing North Shore Lifeguards and the EMTs at the Waialua and Kahuku stations, and to increase public awareness about the proposed City project, the Save Sharks Cove Alliance will hold a second “Rally@Rock Piles” on Saturday May 4, along the Ke Ala Pūpūkea Bike Path (7 am to 2 pm). Residents and visitors are encouraged to walk, bike, and roll by for more information, to thank our Lifeguards and EMTs, and to sign the ongoing Petition in support of the new Center. If you are driving by, throw a shaka or honk!

Supporters are also strongly encouraged to come to the Mayor’s Town Hall on May 16 at Waialua Elementary. The Town Hall starts at 7:00 pm. Please come one hour early at 6:00 pm to join us outside the cafeteria, meet some of our beloved community first responders at the “Rally for Our First Responders.” Pick up a free t-shirt (“Rescue at Sharks Cove” designed by Peter Cole Jr.), a cool “North Shore Guards” wristband, and more.

Growing momentum for the North Shore First Responder Center comes not only from the Mayor’s Administration but also from the Honolulu City Council. A budget request proposed by Councilmember Matt Weyer to add \$500,000 to the City budget in support of the planning and design of the North Shore “Ocean Safety” Center, with a location to be determined in that process, was unanimously supported at two hearings by the City Council so far and in testimony by Dr. Jim Ireland, the Director of the Honolulu Emergency Services Department. This budget item will get two more hearings in the coming weeks – in the Budget Committee again and in full Council. ## The Social Isolation Epidemic

In May 2023, the United States Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy issued a Surgeon General Advisory, sounding the alarm on the pressing epidemic of loneliness, isolation, and lack of connection in the US. This is a crisis that demands our attention. In our primary care clinic, we have responded by implementing annual "social determinants of health" screenings, which now include screening for social isolation. As a primary care physician and a member of this community, I am deeply concerned by the high number of positive screening tests for social isolation across all age and gender groups.

The Surgeon General's Advisory provides a roadmap for individuals, parents, community-based organizations, workplaces, and government systems to combat the social isolation epidemic. At the individual level, it encourages us to prioritize participation in social/community groups, civic engagement, and investing time in nurturing current relationships. Engaging in activities such as sports groups (e.g., canoe paddling, club soccer), hobby groups (e.g., hiking groups, sewing groups), religious programs (e.g., church, prayer groups), and neighborhood board involvement can significantly enhance social connections. Remember, even reaching out to your homebound neighbors, such as kūpuna who cannot drive, can make a difference in curbing the social isolation pandemic at the individual level.

At the community level, the Surgeon General's Advisory urges community groups to create opportunities and spaces for inclusive social connection purposely. Local community groups already facilitating these events include the Waiālua Community Association and Mālama Loko Ea Foundation.

If you find yourself suffering from loneliness, isolation, and a lack of connection, please reach out to your primary care provider for some ideas on how to help remedy this.

# Aloha from The North Shore Hanapa'a Club

The Hale'iwa Jackpot Fishing Tournament (H.J.F.T.) preceded what most people today know as the North Shore Hanapa'a Jackpot Fishing Tournament.

Birth of the H.J.F.T. originated in a conversation between two of Haleiwa's well-known fishermen Richard Galius and Hilary Orillo while participating in a fishing tournament on the West side.

"Eh, how many Hale'iwa boats in this tournament?" remarked Richard. "Why we no can make our own tournament in Hale'iwa?"

In 1980, along with Richard, Hilary, Sony Williams, Gil Abrigo, Joe Calauastro, Barney Oga, the "Reels" were set in motion.

Days later Richard and Hilary were on the Bruce Carter fishing show, later renamed, "Let's Go Fishing" to promote the Hale'iwa Jackpot. Other guests on the show were organizers of the big game fishing tournament from Kailua-Kona. Richard and Hilary were given the impression that "You guys not going last!"

After several successful years, the Hale'iwa Jackpot blossomed into one of Hawaii's Premier fishing tournaments drawing entrance from Hale'iwa, island wide, and the mainland.

In 1983, the H.J.F.T. would become the North Shore Hanapa'a Jackpot Fishing Tournament, simply called "The Hanapa'a" to continue the tradition established by Richard and gang.

With less than one month to prepare, the North Shore Hanapa'a Club, spearheaded by Patrick Nash along with Lester W, Rose M, and Eddie B had a formidable task to tackle.

After a humbling beginning, 42 plus years later, "the tournament that would not last," continues to draw fishermen (and women) with balls to challenge the North Shore of O'ahu.

Not to be forgotten are the businesses, private citizens, volunteers of this community, island wide, and the State of Hawai'i.

This event will continue to flourish.

### More Real Estate TRENDS

Aloha North Shore readers. I know I have been writing a lot about Legislative and City Ordinances - and I'll try to diversify in the near future - however, for now, there are still more:

#### -CITY ORDINANCE 23-3 "Shoreline Setbacks" set to go into effect July 1st:

This Ordinance changes the Shoreline Setbacks for all O'ahu beachfront properties from the current 40' to a new setback of 60' + 70x the Annual Sand-Loss (but no more than 130' Setback) making just about every oceanfront home on O'ahu "Legal Non-Conforming". I'm afraid this is going to be a rude awakening for many oceanfront owners in the near future.

For more info and how to get involved, please email me ([richard@sterman.com](mailto:richard@sterman.com)) as we now have a non-profit advocacy group called Shoreline Preservation Coalition (SPC) that you can join.

#### -STATE HB2248 "Action Plan for Beach Management":

This House Bill is moving forward and, if passed, will fund a study to find actual "Solutions" to our sand-erosion issues. Denise Antolini and I co-authored an article on this a few NSN issues ago ("Finding Common Ground" - pgs. 12 & 13 of the March 13th NSN, read NSN back issues at [northshorenews.com](http://northshorenews.com)) and we were both advocates of this Bill. My opinion is that we can't just let more houses fall into the ocean... we have to come up with viable and helpful "Solutions" and this Bill may be the start to that goal.

#### -STATE BILL 64 "AG LAND USE ORDINANCE":

This House Bill (the old "Bill 10") has popped up again to change the Land Use Ordinance for Ag Lands... including restrictions on Agri-Businesses, Land Use Permitting, minimum % of land dedication to Crops/Livestock, changes to Destination Events and Animal Raising. There is time to testify on this one and/or call your State Representatives.

It was a magical day as Hawaiian surfer Gabriela Bryan won her first major title on the World Surf League Tour in Western Australia. It was at the Margaret River pro an epic location where dolphins are always on tap! Indeed they were because Gabriela surfed with them in her final heat where she said, "When I kicked out, I was just wow! That wave was sent to me by someone, with dolphins in it. It was magical." Hurley's Bryan whipped a full on cut back into the white water and went off the top as the dolphins rode with her, not phasing her at all. Bryan, 22, is a former rookie on tour and a finalist many times. This time it was her day in the powerful right hander. She out scored Sawyer Lindblad for the win and made the dreaded half tour cut launching herself into 5th overall. Bryan now has a chance to be in the final five surf-off to claim a world title. New stop, Tahiti's left hand tube at Teahupo'o. Bryan does not shy away from heavy waves and has competed at Pipeline from a young age so she has a chance to find a winning wave in Tahiti. ## HAWAII WINS LONGBOARD GOLD

The International Surfing Association, the leader in organizing the Olympics had their World Longboard Championship in Surf City, El Salvador. It was a clean sweep for team Hawaii! Hawaii earned its first Team World Championship winning gold medals in both women's and men's individual divisions, as well as the team gold medals. Honolulu Blomfield from the North Shore won her first women's ISA World Championship, while 2018 World Champion Kai Sallas, Honolulu, won his second. The surf was epic with long, clean four foot surf with perfect conditions through-out the event. Sallas's nose riding was outstanding in combination with solid turns in the perfect conditions. "The waves are insane. It's the kind of day where if you were just free-surfing you'd pull up and look out there and just be psyching to get out and surf and we get to compete. Big shout out to ISA and Fernando Aguerre for running this amazing event. I really hope that longboarding goes into the Olympics. I think we're proving that it belongs there." In Blomfield's heat she scored an 8.43, the highest of the heat at the end of the final to take the win. "Honestly, I'm at a loss for words," an emotional Blomfield said. "I really wanted it so bad

and for it to come and happen to me, it feels insane. It means a lot, I was paddling out for my heat and Kai had a 9... It kind of fired me up more than usual. And then for his heat to end and then get the gold, I was just like, now I have to put my feet in the right places and get the right waves and I can do it too. It really fired me up and inspired me."

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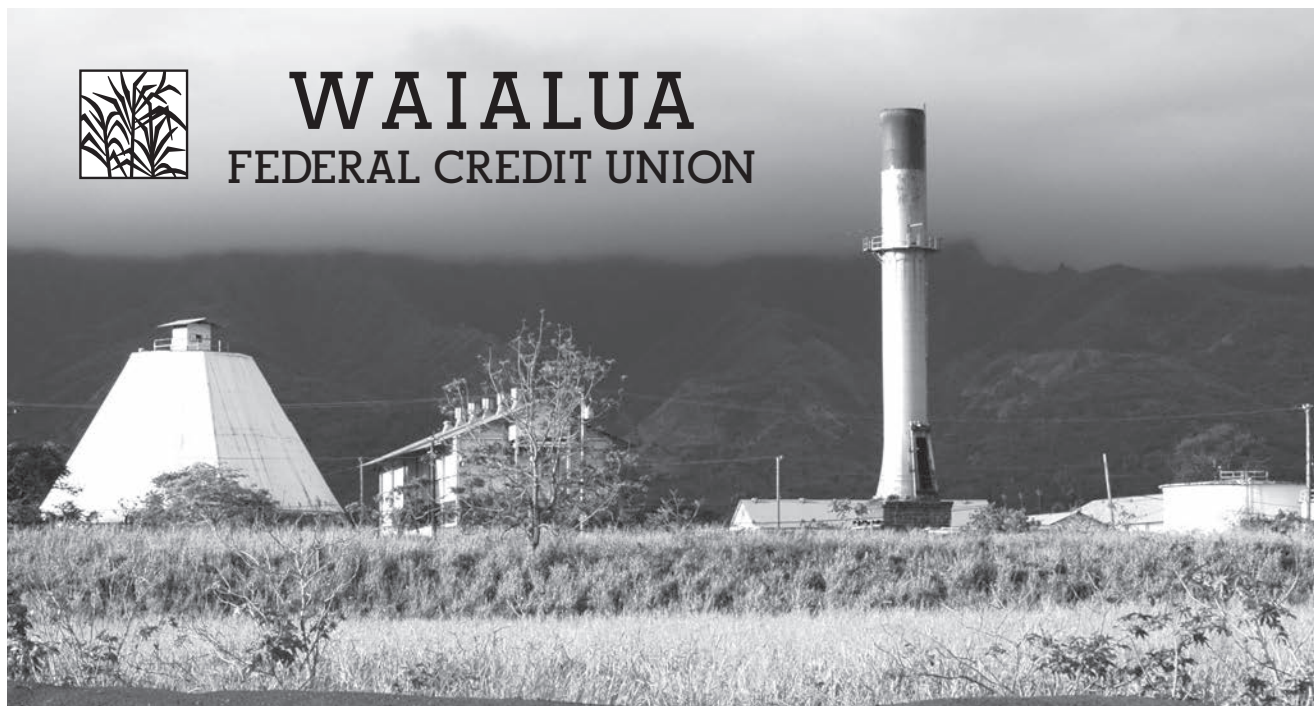
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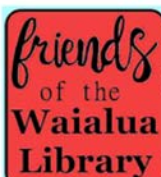

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# News from the North Shore Outdoor Circle

On April 22nd the North Shore Outdoor Circle (NSOC), a branch of The Outdoor Circle, the oldest environmental organizations in Hawaii, held its Spring General Membership Meeting. NSOC President Stone Williams opened the meeting with a short history of how the North Shore Outdoor Circle started as the Waialua Outdoor Circle, originated by the wives of the Plantation Managers - Mrs. John Midkiff and Mrs. John Anderson.

Vice President Rex Dubiel Shanahan reported on the Ke Ala Pupukea Bike Path and secured a grant for \$500,000 for design and planning. She supports and attends bimonthly meetings with the City and County of Honolulu and reported the contract for the planning and design has been signed.

Corresponding Secretary Lea Albert spoke about how billboards were banned in the 1920s by a group of very powerful women who were The Outdoor Circle. The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) website at honolulu.gov provides information on legal and illegal signs. Call DPP if you see an illegal sign. NSOC members Dawn Peerson and Ruth Holmberg traveled through Haleiwa looking for illegal signs, they reported these violations to DPP and the signs were immediately removed. This is a community issue, join the NSOC in this mission.

Treasurer Yvonne Alexander spoke about Torch Ginger Alley in Waimea Valley which is adopted by the NSOC. Volunteers show up every third Monday of the month to help weed, deadhead, and beautify this portion of the valley.

Advisor Ruth Holmberg reported on the status of Weed Circle, the gateway to Haleiwa. The NSOC is hoping to receive a grant to secure a new irrigation system and plant new trees to replace the ones that perished from lack of water.

Vice President Dawn Peerson spoke about the Beautification Committee. It is important to recognize when good things are happening in the neighborhoods around the North Shore. Every year the NSOC's Beautification Committee presents awards to deserving neighbors who have taken extra care to help our North Shore environment and scenery.

Arborist Doug DeMoss spoke about the problems with the Coconut Rhinoceros Beetle (CRB). He showed us a live beetle, and educated us on the arrival of the beetle. The CRB arrived on military transport at Hickam Airforce Base, spread to Hickam Golf Course where the beetle was first discovered in mulch along the boundary fence. The CRB spread island wide from unrestricted movement of mulch, especially from farms in central Oahu. DeMoss explained the potential of losing most of our palms, if not treated. If you have the beetle in your trees, it is recognizable by the distinctive sliced off look of the leaves. DeMoss

has found that Arboreta 10 imidacloprid injected into the xylem of the palm is the best way to handle the problem. In his experience, this treatment is good for a year. The poison does not affect the dirt, but it does affect the fruit, all nuts and flowers must be removed from the tree before it is treated. Bees are not adversely affected, and harvesting of the nuts can occur the following year.

There were many questions from the audience. DeMoss said he could save a tree as long as it had a single green frond. His last words of advice were "make sure to use a certified arborist or landscape professional to inject your palms to ensure proper dosage and injection protocol."

# Why Wai?

Water is essential to life on earth. From rivers and oceans to the blood that flows through our veins, water is crucial to the existence of life on earth. The entire planet’s surface is over 70 percent water, our bodies contain anywhere from 55 to 75 percent water.

Water from the ocean is evaporated by the sun and conjured up by the clouds which are blown across the Pacific by the Tradewinds. When the clouds hit the steep slopes of the windward mountain ranges the rain falls down as fresh water which is captured by streams and sifted into the groundwater and eventually the aquifer. So it is with the Kamananui Stream that runs through Waimea Valley to the original big surf beach at Waimea Bay. Our stream is rain fed and water captured from miles away with its beginnings from the Ko’olau Mountain summit or along the way to our land.

Kane, the greatest of the Hawaiian gods created water, a sacred life force originating from the sky in the form of rain, the true beginning of the ahupua’a. The name Waimea means “reddish waters” ‘High levels of iron oxide give Hawaii’s rich volcanic soil its red hue; heavy rains deposit these sediments into streams and waialele (waterfall). Believing it to have powers of healing, injured or sick Hawaiians would bathe in reddish water and would sit in such waters even when they didn’t run red. (“Cultural Sites”, waimeavalley.net)

Wai (freshwater) is sacred to Hawaiian people. Ka wai ola, or life-giving waters, in the form of rivers, streams, springs, and ponds represent life, purity, and health. The word for wealth or value in Hawaiian is waiwai (water-water), because of its necessity for sustaining life. In the past, Hawaiians never defiled a freshwater source. All bathing and washing were done closer to the ocean, near the end of the stream or river. (“Cultural Sites”, waimeavalley.net)

It is our responsibility to take care of these sacred waters. We are to be stewards of this beautiful land and water. Chemicals used in conventional farming and manufacturing can leach into the soil and runoff into our water. Contaminant spills and introduced substances compromise our precious aquifers and ecosystems. Without clean water there is no life.

We invite you to come visit Waimea Valley and swim in the healing waters. Admission for Kamaaina is free every Thursday from 12pm-3pm. You can support Waimea Valley’s campaign to address its ageing water system through the Ka Wai Kupuna fundraiser at [waimeavalley.net/ka-wai-kupuna](http://waimeavalley.net/ka-wai-kupuna). Also keep in mind that any removal of debris from the watershed system through our volunteer programs improves the overall health of the ahupua’a.
