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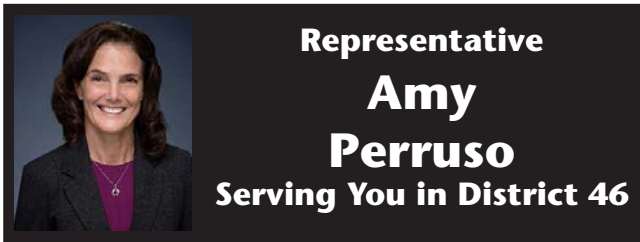

The 2024 session of the Hawaii State Legislature was marked by a series of significant legislative achievements and disappointments, reflecting the complex interplay of political, economic, and social forces shaping the state's future.

### Big Wins

**1. SB 2919: Phasing Out Short-Term Rentals (STRs)** by giving counties the power to phase out short-term rentals so as to increase the availability of long-term housing for residents. The proliferation of STRs has contributed to the housing shortage and inflated rental prices, exacerbating the homelessness crisis. Empowering counties to regulate STRs more effectively will help stabilize the housing market, making it more accessible and affordable for local families.

**2. SB 2619: Funding the Department of Agriculture (DOA) for Invasive Species** that pose a severe threat to Hawaii's unique ecosystems, agriculture, and economy. This legislation will enable the DOA to enhance its efforts in eradicating and controlling these species, thereby protecting native flora and fauna, agricultural productivity, and overall environmental health.

**3. HB 1800: Stabilizing Funding for DOE and UH,** providing a consistent financial foundation and supports the educational infrastructure necessary for Hawaii's future. This year, we began to acknowledge the chronic underfunding issues that have plagued the state's educational institutions, promoting better educational outcomes and opportunities for all students.

### Big Losses

**1. HB 2690: Protecting Our Water** died in conference committee. Stream flow restoration and the enforcement of Hawaii's public trust water laws are vital to the stewardship of healthy ahupua'a systems where indigenous traditional and customary food systems can thrive. This measure would have protected Water Commission members and staff from the influence of opportunistic and politically connected corporate interests and supported remediation efforts at Red Hill.

**2. HB 955: Providing a Pathway to Licensure for Traditional Midwives,** recognizing their role in maternal health care, particularly in underserved communities. The defeat of this bill is a setback for women's health rights and limits access to culturally sensitive birthing options. It also perpetuates the regulatory barriers that traditional midwives face, undermining efforts to diversify and improve maternal health services.

**3. HB 2686: Addressing Rising Condo Insurance Costs** by tackling the escalating costs and risks associ-

ated with condominium insurance. With the increasing frequency of natural disasters and aging infrastructure, condo owners face rising premiums and limited coverage options. The failure of this bill means that many residents will continue to struggle with unaffordable insurance costs, potentially threatening their financial stability and homeownership.

### Missed Opportunities

**1. Climate Change Action:** Despite the pressing need for climate change mitigation and adaptation measures, the legislature failed to pass significant climate-related bills. Hawaii's vulnerability to sea level rise, extreme weather, and other climate impacts necessitates urgent legislative action to protect communities and ecosystems. The lack of progress on this front is a missed opportunity to strengthen Hawaii's resilience and leadership in climate action.

**2. Cesspool Conversion:** Efforts to address the widespread issue of cesspools, which pose severe environmental and health risks, did not advance. Converting cesspools to more sustainable wastewater systems is critical for protecting water quality and public health. The legislature's inaction on this issue delays necessary environmental improvements and places continued strain on Hawaii's natural resources.

**3. Investment in Agriculture and Food Systems:** The legislature also missed the chance to make substantial investments in agriculture and food systems planning. While funds were allocated for hunger relief through programs like DA BUX and local food banks, broader support for regenerative farming practices and farm-to-school programs fell short. Additionally, there was no movement on addressing the "SNAP cliff," which affects food security for many families. Supporting food producers and investing in sustainable agriculture are essential for ensuring food equity and security in Hawaii.

### Conclusion

The 2024 legislative session in Hawaii showcased both progress and setbacks in addressing critical issues facing the state. While significant strides were made in housing, environmental protection, and education funding, the failure to advance crucial water protection, maternal health, and insurance reform measures highlights ongoing challenges. Moreover, the missed opportunities in climate action, cesspool conversion, and agricultural investment underscore the need for continued advocacy and legislative effort to build a resilient, equitable, and sustainable future for Hawaii. I look forward to working with our communities across the pae 'āina to address these issues.

I'm delighted to share that Resolution 24-103 and Resolution 24-50 were successfully passed during our recent City Council meeting on May 15th. Resolution 24-103 approves the creation of an independent Department of Ocean Safety. Because the creation of an Ocean Safety Commission must be approved by voters, Resolution 24-50 allows for the question of an Ocean Safety Commission to appear on November's ballot. Both resolutions complement each other in facilitating the transparent and efficient progression of an Ocean Safety Department to both support the needs of our first responders and enhance public safety. Our committed lifeguards tirelessly watch over our residents and families from morning till night, ensuring their safety throughout O'ahu. I'm eager to continue my support and appreciate the collaboration with the administration, my Council colleagues, and our community to guarantee that our first responders receive the resources they need to keep our community safe.

The Mayor's town hall for Waiialua, Hale'iwa, Pūpūkea that was originally scheduled for May 16, 2024, and was postponed due to severe weather, has been rescheduled to Thursday, June 20, 2024 at 7:00 p.m at Waiialua Elementary School. Please take this opportunity to come out and share your concerns about what you would like to see in our communities.

I also wanted to provide some community highlights. First off, congratulations to all of our graduating seniors celebrating this season! I am so proud of your hard work, and I wish you the best on all of your future endeavors. In May, I was grateful to attend the Wahiawa's Lion's Club 2024 Outstanding First Responder Award ceremony. We recognized five outstanding individuals for their service to the community. On behalf of the City and County of Honolulu, I had the privilege to presenting Honorary Certificates to the following deserving awardees:

Outstanding Police Officer— Police Officer Timothy Inuma, Outstanding Fire Fighter— Firefighter 1 Ryan Alvarado, Outstanding Military Police Officer— Sgt. Riley Bonaventura, Outstanding Life Guard— Jared Jovero and Outstanding EMS Employee— Ruddy Hernandez.

Aloha! My name is Mrs. Valerie Maluyo. I am a third-grade teacher at Waialua Elementary School. My students and I love living on the North Shore. Many of my students are avid surfers, snorkelers, swimmers, and beach go-ers.

We have noticed increased traffic on the beaches near us. One disturbing trend is that the visitors are not aware that the coral reef is a living thing and thus very easy to damage by stepping on it.

### Regulatory Physical Exams: Commercial Driver and Aviation Medical Exams

As medical providers, we can do additional training to get certified to do regulatory exams for Federal agencies such as the US Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration and Federal Aviation Administration. These exams force us to remove our “primary care” hat and only to be privy to data provided by the examinee. As of April 2024, I am now certified to do both commercial driver's license (CDL) medical exams and pilot class 2 and 3 aviation medical exams (AME) at our Hale'iwa clinic!

For both of these regulatory exams, the examinee, pilot or commercial driver, must be honest and disclose their medical history to the examiner. The goal of the exam is to make sure 1) you're taking care of your health, 2) you can safely operate a huge, dangerous vehicle or airplane, and 3) the public is protected from people who might want to do so but are medically not able to maneuver these machines safely.

If you'd like to schedule a CDL or AME with me at our Hale'iwa clinic, please call 808-691-8501. You need not be a primary care patient at our clinic to complete an AME with me. For both exams, make sure you bring the required documentation for any medical conditions you might have, as I will not be able to review your Queen's Health System electronic medical record as part of the exam. Also, if we find something on the exam that needs a primary care provider's review, we can quickly schedule you for an assessment with one of the other providers in our clinic, too!

I also regularly complete US Coast Guard captain physicals for boat captains. For the CDL and captain physical exams we ask that you be a primary care patient within the Queen's Health System to schedule the exam.

### Memorial Day Celebration 2024

Saturday, May 25, 2024, a beautiful Hawaiian morning brought together more than 100 people at the Haleiwa War Memorial to honor and pay their respects to the brave men and women whose names grace the plaques on the memorial.

The event was organized by The North Shore Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club of Hawaii with Rene Mansho as Master of Ceremonies. Erica Lehmkuhl, US Army retired, a member of the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and owner of Seaside Realty sang our National Anthem a cappella so beautifully it raised chicken skin. Reverend Taiken Akiyama, 96 years young of Haleiwa Shingon Mission gave the invocation.

We welcomed Dr. George Tanabe to give us the history of the War Memorial which his uncle, Walter, designed. 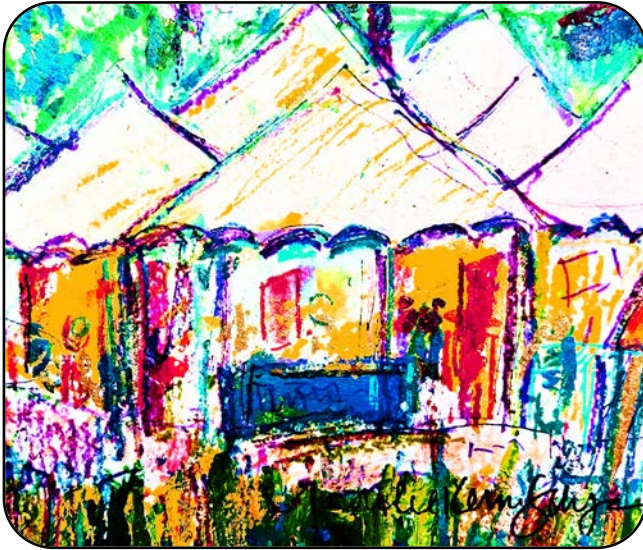

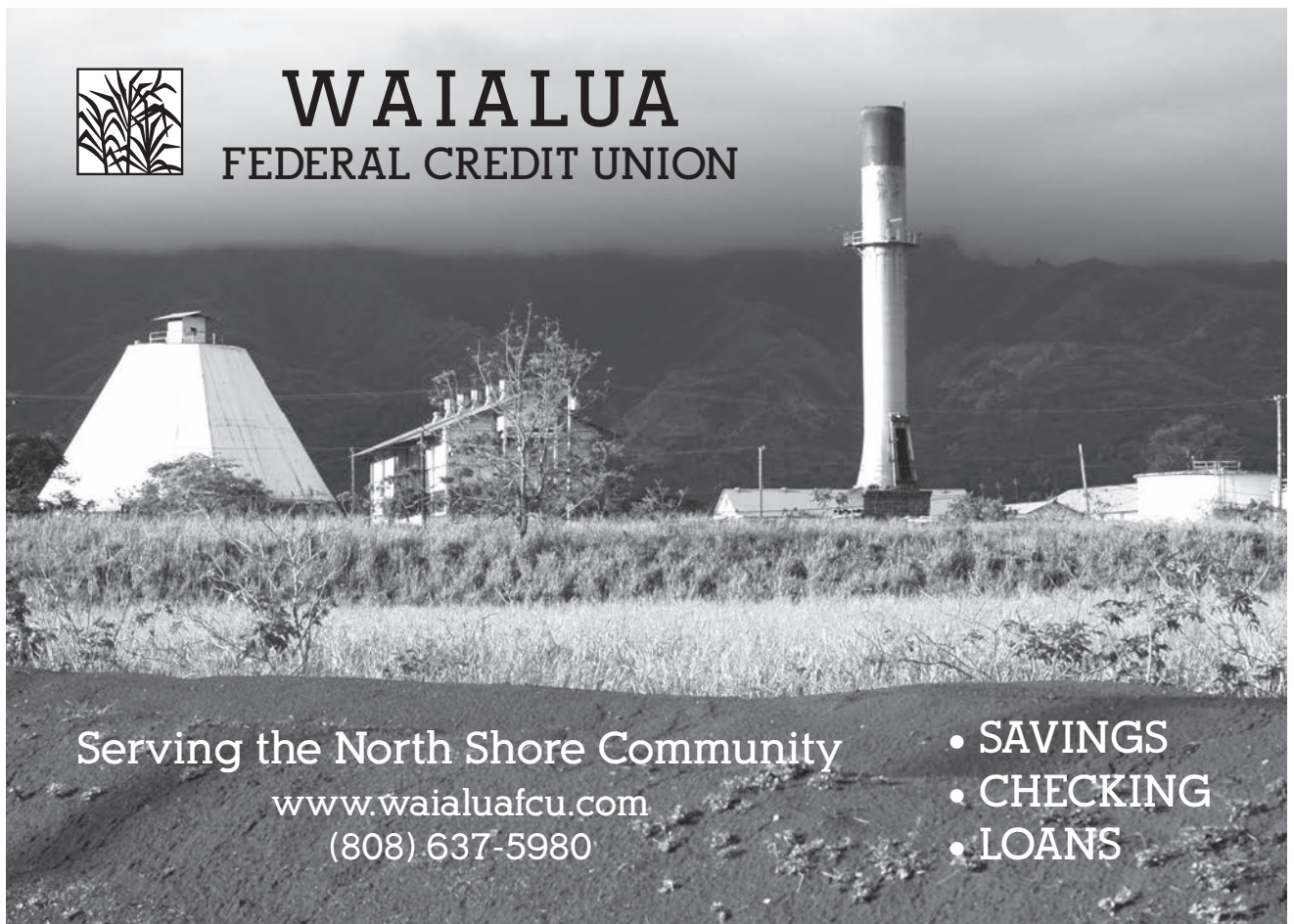

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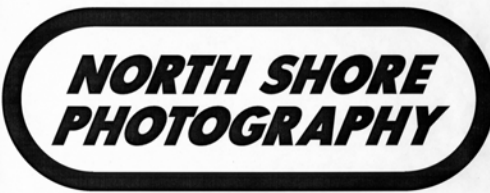

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## BANZAI NORTH SHORE WIRELESS

### STORM SEASON JUNE 1st TO NOVEMBER 31st

If you have not checked it out, the Hurricane forecast season predictions are in. It looks great for the Pacific region. The National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration says there is a 30% chance of a normal season and only 20% chance of an above normal season. Normally the season from June 1st to November 31st has four or five hurricanes, tropical storms or tropical depressions but because there will be a La Niña condition there will be less. Sounds like good news but it's Mother Nature so be prepared anyway. The La Niña condition is forecasted to be mid summer. La Niña conditions favor vertical wind shear that makes it harder for a cluster of thunderstorms and storms to develop into bigger storms. The alphabetical list of names is as follows. Aleeta, Bud, Carlotta, Daniel, Emilia, Fabio, Gilma, Hector, Ileana, John, Kristy, Lane, Miriam, Norman, Olivia, Paul, Rosa, Sergio, Tara, Vicente, Willa, Xavier, Eland, Zeke. ### DELICATE ECOSYSTEM

In 2018 Gov. David Ige signed Senate Bill 2571 into law, making Hawaii the first place in the world to ban "the sale, and distribution of sunscreens that contain the chemicals oxybenzone and octinoxate" after many studies showed that those two chemicals cause genetic damage to marine life including coral reefs. We need to use reef safe sunscreens that contain natural minerals like zinc oxide or titanium dioxide. Check labels and if you see a store that is still selling sunscreens that contain harmful, reef bleaching products, remind them!! I found a great product. Marine biologist Ocean Ramsey teamed up with Raw Elements for World Reef Day and created a great one and it is small enough to take out surfing!

### JUNIOR WORLD SURFING

The North Shore has so many great surfers! We have to cheer on our young ones in hopes they go on to be world champions and represent Hawaii well. Recently there was a reason to cheer! Our Hawaii surfers competed in the ISA Junior World Championships in El Salvador. The waves were epic 3-6 feet during the week of competition. Overall Australia won team gold with Hawaii taking the silver, France Bronze and USA copper. The North Shore's Luke Tema was equal 25th out of about 130 under 18 males, a great showing. In

the girls under 16 Chesney Guinotte and Ski Suit were equal 13th. I'm sure they wanted to do better but a great representation from our local surfers. I have to give a shout out to Honolulu's Vaihiti Inso who won gold in the 18 under girls and helped Hawaii win the overall silver. The International Surfing Association is the organizer of Olympic surfing so the event is very prestigious. Congrats to all of Hawaii's surfers!
